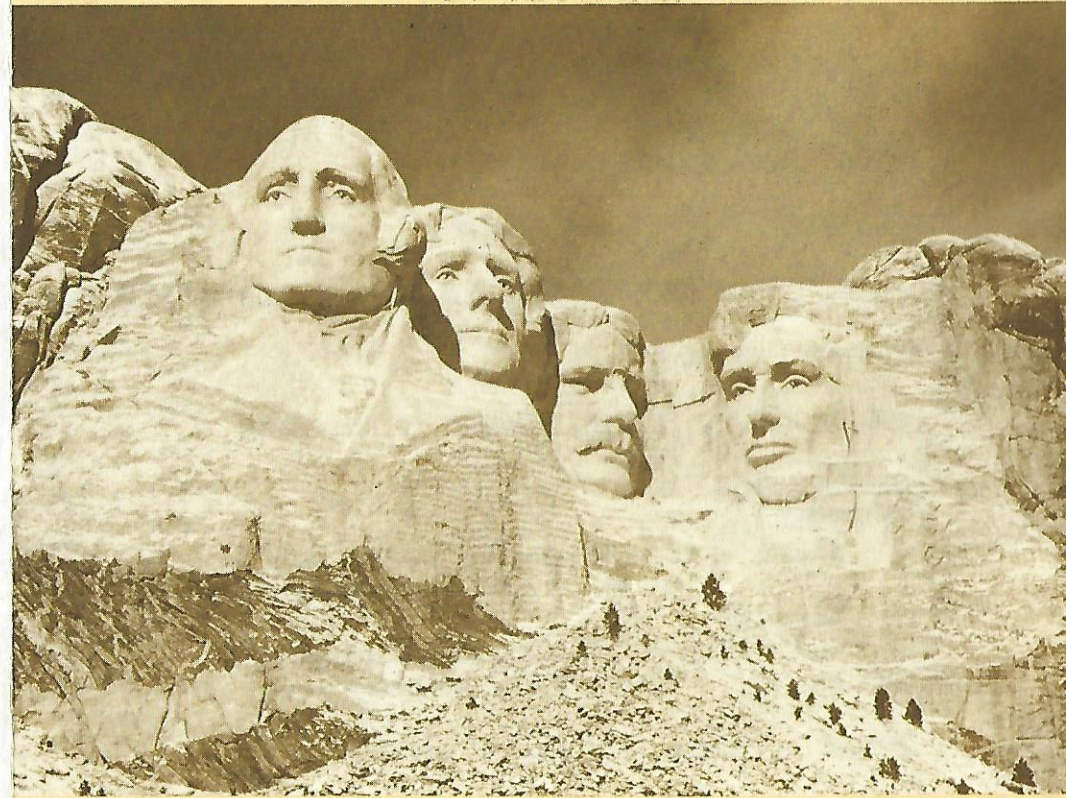

"The Price of Freedom..."

It is fitting that the faces of our national heroes be carved in rock, for a rocklike character was common to these men who varied greatly in gifts and personality. Indeed, such firmness and strength must be characteristic of a whole people if they are to avoid government by tyranny.

In recent years, we have seen the rise of a number of extremist groups that threatened the traditional liberties of Americans. Thanks to the alertness of our established institutions—including our Christian churches—these organizations have been exposed and discredited in the view of most thoughtful persons. But such reminders warn us that we must never grow complacent about our freedom. "Subversion," a prominent newspaper recently pointed out, "whether of the right or of the left, is still subversion." Hitler and Stalin represented opposite ends of the political spectrum, equally intolerable to the free spirit of man.

It has often been said that our churches are our strongest bulwark against communism, and this we believe to be true. But other forms of tyranny can take root while our attention is taken up in watching communism. The church, which can accept direction only from its Lord, values its freedom in this land, that we can serve him without the hindrances suffered by Christians in nondemocratic parts of the world. Thus of all Americans, Christians have the strongest motivation for eternal vigilance.
